HONORARY DEGREE

ANGELO di BENEDETTO

ANGELO di BENEDETTO, painter, sculptor, teacher, urban environmentalist, and champion of civil rights, has established an international reputation during his multi-faceted life. Born in Paterson, New Jersey, and educated at Cooper Union Art School, he received a scholarship to study at Boston Museum of Fine Arts and at Harvard.

After Pearl Harbor he volunteered for a War Department project in Africa, assisting the Allies five months before General Eisenhower's invasion, after which he became a lieutenant in the United States Air Corps.

In the last two decades, his advocacy of open space in the urban areas and the use of art in the outdoor visual world has earned him accolades from Japan, Finland, France, and Italy. He has been consultant to cities in twenty-two states in America. These civic and urban activities have earned for him consultant services and positions for the Department of the Interior in its concern for the future of our national parks and recreation areas. In 1968 he was President of Art For The Cities, a nonprofit organization of artists which created Burns Park in Denver, which became a prototype for similar parks all over America. In 1970 he was appointed by Governor John Love to the Colorado Arts Council for a term of five

years and has helped shape the course of the arts in Colorado for many years to come.

His paintings and other works, exhibited in more than ninety museums in America, including the Metropolitan and the National Gallery in Washington, D.C., have been reproduced and written about in nearly every magazine in America, bringing attention to his adopted State of Colorado. In our State educational institutions, including Denver University, he has given pilot courses in Art Appreciation and the Humanities to over 3,000 students. He has lectured extensively concerning the Universality of Artistic Thought and the Function of the Artist in Colorado and throughout the West. Along with community and civic activities, he has maintained a national and international status, not only as an artist, by being selected consistently for representation as a creative and influential force in American and foreign art surveys but also as a representative of Colorado and its young vitality in the development of the Arts and Humanities.

Angelo di Benedetto's deep humanitarian concern has been felt here and around the world, especially in Haiti, South America, Mexico, Africa, and Europe.

Mr. President, in recognition of his accomplishments and devotion to the heritage of the West, I have the honor to present Angelo di Benedetto for the degree, Doctor of Humane Leters, honoris causa.

REGENT EMERITUS RECOGNITION

WHEREAS, Thomas S. Moon of Boulder, Colorado, has concluded his term on the Board of Regents; and

WHEREAS, he was instrumental in the emergence of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs, first as an alumnus, businessman, and concerned citizen in Colorado Springs, and then as a Regent; and

WHEREAS, during his service on the Board, he has been particularly active in the reorganization of the University, the formative years of the Auraria Board, the restructuring of and service on the University Investment Committee, and the Board of Regents/City of Boulder Committee; and

WHEREAS, in spite of heavy responsibilities outside the University, he made time available to meet with members of the University's con-

stituencies, and with the variety of committees on which he served; and

WHEREAS, he has carried out his duties and responsibilities with distinguished and outstanding dedication and concern for the best interests and welfare of the University, which contributed greatly toward the continued growth and stature of this institution.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Regents expresses to Thomas S. Moon its deep appreciation for his conscientious and dedicated service to the University of Colorado and to the State of Colorado, and commends him for his many valued contributions as a member of the Board; and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that he be granted the title of Regent Emeritus of the University of Colorado and be suitably honored at the May 1977 Commencement of the University.

THE NORLIN CHARGE TO GRADUATES

(From the baccalaureate address by President George Norlin, of the University of Colorado, June 1935.)

"You are now certified to the world at large as alumni of the University. She is your kindly mother and you her cherished sons and daughters.

"This exercise denotes, not your severance from her, but your union with her, Commencement does not mean, as many wrongly think, the breaking of ties and the beginning of a life apart. Rather it marks your initiation in the fullest sense into the fellowship of the University, as bearers of her torch, as centers of her influence, as promoters of her spirit.

"The University is not the campus, not the buildings on the campus, nor the faculties, not the students of any one time—not one of these or all of them. The University consists of all who come into and go forth from her halls, who are touched by her influence and who carry on her spirit. Wherever you go, the University goes with you. Wherever you are at work there is the University at work.

"What the University purposes to be, what it must always strive to be, is represented on its seal, which is stamped on your diplomas—a lamp in the hands of youth. If its light shine not in you and from you, how great is the darkness! But if it shine in you, today and in the thousands before you, who can measure its power?

"With hope and faith, I welcome you into the fellowship. I bid you farewell only in the sense that I pray you may fare well. You go forth, but not from us. We remain, but not severed from you. God go with you and be with you and us."

ACADEMIC DRESS

The tradition of the academic costume apparently began during the twelfth or thirteenth century in the early European universities. Since the clergy composed the majority of the educated class, academic dress is an adaptation of the cope or mantle which was usually of silk or wool, and worn by church dignitaries in religious processions.

Through the years, great diversity in color and in style of cap, gown and hood developed. In 1896, the colleges and universities in the United States adopted a uniform code governing academic dress. Today, the black gown, hood, and mortar board worn by the graduates in most institutions follow this code.

While it is not apparent to the casual observer, the gowns worn by the recipients of the various degrees vary somewhat in design. The sleeves of the gown worn by the baccalaureate candidate are long and pointed, while

the sleeves of the gown worn by the master's degree recipient are square at one end with a slit at the elbow. The doctor's gown has flowing sleeves with three bars of velvet, and a facing of velvet down the front of the gown.

Those who receive a master's or a doctor's degree from the University of Colorado wear hoods lined with the school colors, silver and gold. The hood worn by the doctor's candidate differs in design from that of the master's as it has side panels and is slightly longer. The velvet border of the hood indicated the degree and usually follows the same code as the color of the tassels.

The oxford cap, usually referred to as a mortar board, is black and has a long tassel which is fastened by a button on the top. Candidates for the baccalaureate degree wear the tassel pendant over the right front of the cap before the degree is conferred, then it is worn on the left side.

The Second Hundred

Twelve months ago the University of Colorado spring graduation exercises enjoyed the distinction of being the Hundredth-Year Commencement and of inaugurating our Centennial Year celebration. It has been a celebration of achievement. With the encouragement and assistance of the University's Centennial Commission, fittingly and ably chaired by President Emeritus Eugene Wilson, several historical projects have contributed greatly to the exploration, understanding, and preservation of our institution's roots in Colorado and the Rocky Mountain region, and have focused on the factors which shaped and tested our growth and development into a nationally recognized system of higher education. As we have looked back and re-evaluated, we have also peered ahead, with insights and foresights from outstanding alumni and faculty. And, despite the inhibitions of economic uncertainty, our Second Century Fund Drive is gaining substantial commitments.

Concurrently, the Centennial Year has seen solid University accomplishments in the face of severe fiscal constraints. We have completed master plans for all of our four campuses. Significant progress has continued toward fair and effective communications and governance arrangements on and between each of those campuses and with central administration and between our nonacademic employees and the state personnel system. Our internal management systems have been markedly improved. Despite discouraging national trends, the dollar volume of our research and other grants has held up remarkably well. Our faculty is doing a superb job. And we keep on attracting a superior student body from the state and nation.

While the projects, special events, and publicity highlighting this major milestone in the University's history are now officially at an end, there must be no flagging in our dedication to serve the generations of tomorrow better. The social and environmental tasks of the world cry louder for the ingenuity and energy of people who need all the knowledge, skill, inventiveness, and capacity to think and discriminate which higher education can engender. We have looked before and after; now we must work at what can be conserved and created on the road to 2076.
