PROJECTIONS

This commencement marks the one hundredth anniversary of graduation ceremonies of the University of Colorado. The class of 1882 included six students and graduated on June 8, 1882; in this year's ceremonies more than 6,500 graduates will receive degrees from the four campuses of the University.

To gain some perspective on the University's growth and development during the past century, one can contrast the single building—Old Main—which comprised the University when the first commencement was held in 1882, to our current four-campus system with buildings, acreage and equipment estimated to be worth in excess of \$300 million. During the first 30 years of its operation, the University awarded a total of 3,498 degrees, and during the first half of the University's existence—from 1882 to 1932—a total of 8,500 degrees were awarded. We are steadily approaching that number of graduates in a single year, and the University of Colorado now has more than 150,000 alumni. I doubt that Joseph Sewall, the University's first president, imagined the future size and breadth of University programs when he made the following comments on the development of the University in his inaugural address*:

"When the University of Colorado shall have an honorable place and name among the institutions of learning of the land, and I shall be sleeping in the shadow of these mountains, or elsewhere. I would ask no prouder eulogy than that some good and true friend should say of me, 'He was in at the birth, he directed its infant steps, and now behold the full grown man'!"

While the University of Colorado now has "an honorable place" among institutions of higher education, I believe we are not yet a "full grown man" and will continue to grow and develop further in the years ahead.

The physical setting of the University — and for that matter of the state and nation — have changed dramatically during the past century. But the same pioneer spirit and eagerness which those early students revealed persist with our current University graduates. The challenges facing our graduates are different and in many ways more complex than those faced by the first initiates. Our current challenges include finding ways to use technology to enhance the human condition, discovering cures for diseases which still elude us, preserving our environment, and developing and maintaining a set of moral principles to guide our actions in a complicated world. The thread of continuity in the University's development is its role in providing students with the skills and knowledge which will enable them to continue to be pioneers in an everchanging world.

As you leave the University, I urge each of you to preserve this attribute and to carry on the University of Colorado's spirit that has served us so well for the last century.

I. IGNACY GOLDBERG

I. IGNACY GOLDBERG'S career as an educator has been dedicated to the proposition that all human beings, regardless of aptitude or handicap, should be provided the opportunity for an education. That strong commitment led him to become one of the most prolific and outspoken supporters of quality programs in special education at the master and doctorate levels during a long and productive career at Teachers College, Columbia University.

Through his years as educational director at a state institution for the retarded, educational consultant to the Ntiaonl Association for Retarded Children (now Citizens), as professor of special education, and as an expert witness in a landmark legal struggle, Professor Goldberg has been fighting to salvage what others might have thrown out as garbage.

He has always been at home with controversial issues, and his willingness to tackle such assignments saw him as a major participant in the legal struggle that resulted in the establishment of the right of the severely handicapped to publicly supported education. His assignment as an expert witness is that case led him to become co-author of

"The Right to Education," a volume that lays the base for the educational right of all.

His influence has spread throughout the country and to other parts of the world. And his colleagues all voice the same message. Professor Goldberg cares. His fellow human beings, whether they be comrades in war, handicapped children and adults, colleagues, students, or comparative strangers, are always treated with respect, kindness and concern.

By virtue of his competence and commitment, he has throughout his career served as the role model of what a professional should be, and demonstrated that it can be a person with a disability. As a great teacher and leader, his influence will impact upon many generations for years to come.

Mr. President, in recognition of his many accomplishments during a rewarding and fruitful career and his unbounded determination to further the cause of the disadvantaged, I have the honor to present Professor I. Ignancy Goldberg for the degree, Doctor of Humane Letters, honoris causa.

VIRGINIA GARTH TREMBLY, D.D.S.

DR. VIRGINIA GARTH TREMBLY is in the forefront of a very select group of persons in the history of the University of Colorado who have contributed so unselfishly to insure that higher education continues to flourish.

She is a woman of remarkable achievement who has never sought public recognition. Presentation to her of a University of Colorado Medal is a most appropriate way for the academic community to show appreciation for her distinguished service to the community, her contributions to the advancement of knowledge, and her interest in improving the quality of life for all.

JOHN W. ARMSTRONG, SR.

JOHN W. ARMSTRONG, SR. is one of the staunchest supporters of the development and growth of the Colorado Springs campus of the University of Colorado. His interest and involvement in the emergence of UCCS are added evidence of his efforts towards the continued betterment of the community of which he has been a lifelong resident.

His interest in the University and the establishment of UCCS started two decades ago when he was instrumental in creating local support from many segments of the community for development of an autonomous campus.

His interest in UCCS and the well-being of the University as a whole has continued to this day. He gives generously of his time and considerable talents to the Chancellor's Advisory Council and to the advisory group for the dean of the College of Letters, Arts and Sciences.

THE NORLIN CHARGE TO GRADUATES

(From the baccalaureate address by President George Norlin, of the University of Colorado, June 1935.)

"You are now certified to the world at large as alumni of the University. She is your kindly mother and you her cherished sons and daughters.

"This exercise denotes, not your severance from her, but your union with her. Commencement does not mean, as many wrongly think, the breaking of ties and the beginning of a life apart. Rather it marks your initiation in the fullest sense into fellowship of the University, as bearers of her torch, as centers of her influence, as promoters of her spirit.

"The University is not the campus, not the buildings on the campus, nor the faculties, not the students of any one time — not one of these or all of them. The University consists of all who

come into and go forth from her halls, who are touched by her influence and who carry on her spirit. Wherever you go, the University goes with you. Wherever you are at work there is the University at work.

"What the University purposes to be, what it must always strive to be, is represented on its seal, which is stamped on your diplomas—a lamp in the hands of youth. If its light shine not in you and from you, how great is the darkness! But if it shine in you, today and in the thousands before you, who can measure its power?

"With hope and faith, I welcome you into the fellowship. I bid you farewell only in the sense that I pray you may fare well. You go forth, but not from us. We remain, but not severed from you. God go with you and be with you and us."

ACADEMIC DRESS

The tradition of the academic costume apparently began during the twelfth or thirteenth century in the early European universities. Since the clergy composed the majority of the educated class, academic dress is an adaption of the cope or mantle which was usually of silk or wool, and worn by church dignitaries in religious processions.

Through the years, great diversity in color and in style of cap, gown and hood developed. In 1896, the colleges and universities in the United States adopted a uniform code governing academic dress. Today, the black gown, hood, and mortar board worn by the graduates in most institutions follow this code.

While it is not apparent to the casual observer, the gowns worn by the recipients of the various degrees vary somewhat in design. The sleeves of the gown worn by the baccalaureate are long and pointed, while the sleeves of the gown worn by the master's degree recipient are square at one end with a slit at the elbow. The doctor's gown has flowing sleeves with three bars of velvet, and a facing of velvet down the front of the gown.

Those who receive a master's or a doctor's degree from the University of Colorado wear hoods with the school colors, silver and gold. The hood worn by the doctor's candidate differs in design from that of the master's as it has side panels and is slightly longer. The velvet border of the hood indicated the degree and usually follows the same code as the color of the tassels.

The oxford cap, usually referred to as a mortar board, is black and has a long tassel which is fastened by a button on the top. Candidates for the baccalaureate degree wear the tassel pendant over the right front of the cap before the degree is conferred, then it is worn on the left side.
