To the Class of 1984:

On behalf of the University of Colorado, let me offer my warm congratulations to you. Your graduation is a special milestone in your lives as well as in the life of the University.

Your "milestone" year has particular significance, for 1984 is the year which has gained a certain notoriety because of George Orwell's futurist vision of society. Orwell published his novel in 1949 before most of you were born — the year 1984 probably seemed quite distant at the time of publication, but it has now arrived. While the social and political environment envisioned for 1984 by Orwell has not been realized, the novel is most valuable as a warning rather than a prophecy. Orwell's warning emphasizes potential loss of freedom in a society where language has been corrupted to the point that truth and untruth are indistinguishable, where technology has placed everyone's lives within view of a television screen, and where politics has achieved a level of power which diminishes the importance of the individual.

One of the University's primary goals for your education has been to provide you with certain qualities which will ensure that Orwell's vision is never realized. Among these qualities are the ability to think critically and distinguish truth from error, the ability to communicate with clarity and meaning, and an intellectual perspective which will enable you to view your actions in the context of the past as well as the future. Education is not merely vocationalism, therefore, but is a precondition to the maintenance of personal freedom.

As you embark on careers and further education, I ask each of you to maintain the conviction to distinguish truth from error, to communicate in a way that leads to greater clarity of thought and continued advancement of knowledge, and to reaffirm the importance of individual freedom in our society. Through your actions, you will continue to extend the University's spirit and influence throughout the nation and the world.

HONORARY DEGREE CHARLES HURON KAMAN

The many successes that Charles Huron Kaman has achieved in his business career truly epitomize the entrepreneural spirit so closely associated with the American economic system.

He is a man of tremendous energy, unbounded enthusiasm, keen judgement and steadfastness of purpose, qualities that have been demonstrated time and again during his professional career.

After graduating with honors from the Catholic University of America, Washington, D.C., he began his career in aeronautical engineering with a division of United Aircraft Corporation. Five years later he was chief of aerodynamics. When the company rejected his idea for what he felt would be "everyman's helicopter," he embarked on the hazardous enterprise of starting his own business to prove his point.

Today that company which had its beginning in 1945 as Daman Aircraft Corporation has blossomed into a widely-diversified corporation that operates principally in five industries, Bearing and Supply, Music, Aerospace, Sciences, and Aviation Services. That initial enterprise has grown into Kaman Corporation, with 24 companies in 184 locations that employ more than 4,000 persons.

Of particular significance to the Pikes Peak area is

Kaman Sciences Corporation of Colorado Springs, which consistently has supported scholarly activities at UCCS. Indicative of that support has been the Kaman Sciences-UCCS Science and Engineering Colloquium Series, through which lectures given by scientists and engineers with national and international reputations are available to University faculty and students as well as regional engineers and scientists.

His affiliations and honors in the business world are many, ranging from the Outstanding Man of the Year Award in 1948 to the Dr. Alexander Klemin Award of the American Helicopter Society in 1981.

His interest in the well-being of humanity has been demonstrated by his founding of the Fidelco Guide Dog Foundation to provide guide dogs for the blind. It is the only guide dog school in New England and is unique in the United States, utilizing "Individual Community Training" to custom train each blind person in his or her own home and place of business.

Mr. President, in recognition of his accomplishments in the business world and his contributions to society and his community, I am pleased to have the privilege of presenting Charles Huron Kaman for the degree, Doctor of Science, honoris causa.

University of Colorado Distinguished Service Award JAMES E. HILL

After a long and brilliant career as an officer in the United States Air Force, JAMES E. HILL assumed executive duties with the Colorado Springs Chamber of Commerce in 1980. There he has provided stellar and enthusiastic leadership that has been of great benefit to the community as a whole and of particular significance to the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs.

He has provided guidance, leadership, and wisdom to every challenge he has undertaken. He has recognized the fundamental importance of the University of Colorado to the community at large, and specifically to the high-technology companies that represent the future for the city.

University of Colorado Distinguished Service Award MARGARET TASHER SMITH

MARGARET TASHER SMITH is endowed with unusual vigor, stamina, and ability, and she has devoted a major share of those talents to the service of others, almost from the time she received her degree from the University of Colorado in 1929.

Gracious and warm-hearted, her compassion and concern for people has earned her the respect and esteem of literally thousands, who have benefited from her involvement in civic, cultural and community affairs.

In her years in the Denver area, she was on the original committees working for the community restoration of Central City, an effort that was brought to a very successful completion.

Portsmouth, New Hampshire, has reaped the major harvest of her tireless efforts.

She was one of the original co-founders of the Guild of Strawbery Banke that has given literally thousands of dollars to the Strawbery Banke restoration project.

She is the only woman who has ever been awarded the Paul Harris Fellowship Award by the Portsmouth Rotary Club for the exemplary manner in which she embraced Rotary precepts to an exceptional degree on a continuing basis.

She is co-chairman of the Seacoast Family "Y" capital

fund drive, which is raising a half million dollars for a new facility.

She served three 3-year terms as a coordinator for the Portsmouth Hospital.

She has been on the board of directors of the Seacoast Community Concert Association for more than 20 years, and in each year has led in sales of memberships.

In 1979, she was Seacoast Citizen of the year, and in 1980, she was Portsmouth Citizen of the Year.

The hotel restoration projects she and her husband have undertaken in various areas of the country were capped by their work in restoring the venerable Wentworth by The Sea Hotel so that it is once again a congregating place for the great and near-great from throughout the United States and Europe.

In her retirement, she is busier than ever helping many charities and being concerned with the wellbeing of people in the Seacoast area.

THE NORLIN CHARGE TO GRADUATES

(From the baccalaureate address by President George Norlin, of the University of Colorado, June 1935.)

"You are now certified to the world at large as alumni of the University. She is your kindly mother and you her cherished sons and daughters.

"This exercise denotes, not your severance from her, but your union with her. Commencement does not mean, as many wrongly think, the breaking of ties and the beginning of a life apart. Rather it marks your initiation in the fullest sense into fellowship of the University, as bearers of her torch, as centers of her influence, as promoters of her spirit.

"The University is not the campus, not the buildings on the campus, nor the faculties, not the students of any one time — not one of these or all of them. The University consists of all who come into and go forth

from her halls, who are touched by her influence and who carry on her spirit. Wherever you go, the University goes with you. Wherever you are at work there is the University at work.

"What the University purposes to be, what it must always strive to be, is represented on its seal, which is stamped on your diplomas — a lamp in the hands of youth. If its light shine not in you and from you, how great is the darkness! But if it shine in you, today and in the thousands before you, who can measure its power?

"With hope and faith, I welcome you into the fellowship. I bid you farewell only in the sense that I pray you may fare well. You go forth, but not from us. We remain, but not severed from you. God go with you and be with you and us."

THE PRESIDENTIAL CHAIN OF OFFICE

The Presidential Chain of Office was created in 1980 by Mary Sartor, M.F.A., University of Colorado, Boulder, for the inauguration of President Arnold R. Weber. The Chain was a gift to the University by Mr. and Mrs. David G. Hawthorn, Class of '24

Colorado gold and silver are used throughout the chain to symbolize the importance of those minerals to the history of the State. The gem stones chosen also consist entirely of minerals from Colorado.

Three pendants are suspended on the chain. The back pendant is the Seal of the State of Colorado surrounded by a golden ribbon representing the golden Circle of Knowledge. The top pendant in the front, the Seal of the University of Colorado surmounted by an arch set with diamond and topaz, signifies the necessary link between the search for knowledge and its practical application to the world outside the University. The Seal is supported at the bottom by the laurel wreaths found in the Seal, emblematic of honor and success.

The bottom pendant is centered with a golden topaz indicating man's quest for knowledge. The surrounding ring is paved with fragmented cubes and diamonds which suggest framents of knowledge with brilliant breaksthrough of understanding.

The chain surrounding these pendants symbolizes the endless but ever-changing circle of human knowledge.

THE UNIVERSITY SEAL

The University of Colorado has used three different seals in its lifetime.

The present seal, adopted in 1908, depicts a male Greek classical figure seated against a pillar and holding a scroll. A burning torch framed in laurel is placed beside him. The Greek inscription means "Let your light shine."

According to Denver designer Henry Read, the classical design was used because Greek civilization "stands as the criterion of culture." The laurel symbolizes honor or success, the youth of the figure suggests the "morning of life," and the scroll represents written language.

From 1893 to 1908, a seal was used which copies Wyon's medallion, "Science Trims the Lamp of Life." The classical figure of a kneeling Greek woman was flanked by mariposa lilies, which President Baker described as "a true Colorado flower."

Before 1893, a seal was used which essentially copies the Colorado state seal. It was never adopted by the Regents.

The official seal of the University of Colorado is used only by the Regents in transmitting official business.

ACADEMIC DRESS

The tradition of the academic costume apparently began during the twelfth or thirteenth century in the early European universities. Since the clergy composed the majority of the educated class, academic dress is an adaptation of the cope or mantle which was usually of silk or wool, and worn by church dignitaries in religious processions.

Through the years, great diversity in color and in style of cap, gown and hood developed. In 1896, the colleges and universities in the United States adopted a uniform code governing academic dress. Today, the black gown, hood, and mortar board worn by the graduates in most institutions follow this code.

While it is not apparent to the casual observer, the gowns worn by the recipients of the various degrees vary somewhat in design. The sleeves of the gown worn by the baccalaureate candidate are long and pointed, while the sleeves of the gown worn by the master's degree recipient are square at

one end with a slit at the elbow. The doctor's gown has flowing sleeves with three bars of velvet, and a facing of velvet down the front of the gown.

Those who receive a master's or a doctor's degree from the University of Colorado wear hoods lined with the school colors, silver and gold. The hood worn by the doctor's candidate differs in design from that of the master's as it has side panels and is slightly longer. The velvet border of the hood indicated the degree and usually follows the same code as the color of the tassels.

The oxford cap, usually referred to as a mortar board, is black and has a long tassel which is fastened by a button on the top. Candidates for the baccalaureate degree wear the tassel pendant over the right front of the cap before the degree is conferred, then it is worn on the left side.
