To the Class of 1988:

On behalf of the University of Colorado, I am pleased to extend congratulations upon your achievement. Your graduation is a special milestone in your life, and in the life of the University.

It is customary on these occasions to speak of the opportunities in your future. At this commencement, however, I prefer to dwell, however briefly, upon the University's educational task and the problems you will face in the coming decades.

The University of Colorado has, I trust, imparted to you an important quantity of knowledge and an appreciation of certain societal and ethical values. It is now your obligation to extend and develop your knowledge and values, and to direct these toward the common good, toward creating a better future. You will face unprecedented challenges requiring heroic efforts. Society's hopes rest with you.

HONORARY DEGREE JAMES M. BEGGS

James M. Beggs is chairman of the board of Spacehab Inc., a privately funded commercial operation which is designing a manned laboratory to fit inside space shuttles, providing the capability of conducting in-space experiments.

As the former administrator of the National Aeronautics and Space Administration, Mr. Beggs continues to use his extensive knowledge of space science to further enhance the future of space exploration in this country — a mission he has pursued vigorously for much of his professional career.

Under his leadership from July 1981 through December 1985, NASA conducted a dynamic program of space exploration. Through the successful flights of Voyager II and the infrared astronomy satellite's discovery of new stars, astounding new information was obtained about our universe. In addition, the initial successful flights of the space shuttles Columbia and Challenger were accomplished, and

the European Space Agencies' Spacelab was launched. He remains today one of the free world's leading advocates and spokesmen for a permanent manned presence in space.

Mr. Beggs' achievements with NASA, however, constitute only a small part of his list of accomplishments. As Under Secretary of Transportation, he rescued NASA's Electronics Research Center and turned it into the Transportation Systems Center. Later, as head of aerospace operations for General Dynamics Corp., he had much to do with the successful completion of the project to build the F-16 aircraft.

Therefore, in recognition of his dedication, commitment and untiring efforts to support this nation's space program and the advancement of space science, the Board of Regents is pleased to present James M. Beggs with the degree of Doctor of Science, *honoris causea*.

UNIVERSITY OF COLORADO MEDAL DAVID W. ENOCH

David W. Enoch has had a long and honorable career as one of Colorado's most distinguished jurists. He was one of the original members of the Colorado Court of Appeals, beginning his service in January 1970 on appointment by Governor John Love. He later served as chief judge from July 1979 until his retirement this past March.

In 1952, one year after earning his J.D. degree from the University of Colorado School of Law, Judge Enoch was admitted to practice in the Colorado courts. He practiced law in Colorado Springs for 10 years before being elected to the district court bench in the Fourth Judicial District, where he was a presiding judge until 1966. He joined the Court of Appeals following four more years in private practice.

During his years as an attorney and jurist, Judge Enoch has received numerous honors including admission to practice in the United States Supreme Court, and election as president of the El Paso County Bar Association. In addition to his accomplishments as a jurist, his dedication to civic activities has become legend. Over the past two decades a number of organizations have benefited greatly from his sense of civic responsibility, including the YMCA, Colorado Springs Symphony, Community Chest, Family Service Agency, El Paso County Society for Crippled Children and Adults, Cheyenne Mountain School Board, Kiwanis Club, and churches in both Colorado Springs and Denver.

In recognition of his outstanding achievements in public service and his dedication to his community, the Board of Regents is pleased to present the University of Colorado Medal to Judge David W. Enoch.

DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD KEITH L. GROVE

Keith Larue Grove is a highly respected and accomplished technical and fine arts photographer who, throughout his life and career, has dedicated himself to his country and America's youth.

As a photographer, he is the author of $Keith\ Grove-1$, a collection of black and white photographs, and has contributed photographs for numerous articles in a number of biological research journals. His most recent accomplishment came last summer when he led one of the largest photo projects ever undertaken by the U.S. Forest Service, producing 11,000 slides in a four-month period, covering nearly one-million acres of the Uinta National Forest in Utah.

In addition, he has judged more than 100 photography contests and given numerous one-person photography shows. A member of the Boy Scouts of America for 47 years, he was the photographer for the World Scout Jamboree in Calgary in 1983, and the 75th Anniversary Jamboree in 1985.

He won his first photo contest in 1942 at the age of 12, printing his prize-winning photo with an enlarger he made out of a coffee can fitted to the back of a Kodak bellows-style folding camera. He was encouraged and taught by his uncle, a member of the Pikes Peak Photo Club, and later began his career doing title-boards and special effects for the Alexander Film Comapny in Colorado Springs.

Mr. Grove also dedicated 27 years of his life to the U.S. Air Force, winning a number of decorations including the Bronze Star, the Presidential Unit Citation with two Oak Leaf Clusters, and the Viet Nam Service Medal with three Bronze Stars

In recognition of his outstanding achievements as a photographer and his service to his country and the State of Colorado, the Board of Regents is pleased to present the University of Colorado Distinguished Service Award to Keith L. Grove.

MICHAEL C. BIRD 1988 LEGISLATIVE AWARD

State Senator Mike Bird is currently serving his first term in the Colorado State Senate following four years in the Colorado House of Representatives. During his tenure as a state representative and senator from El Paso County, Mike Bird has worked vigorously on behalf of higher education and the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs.

He is a member of the Joint Budget Committee and is vice chairman of the Appropriations Committee. From 1984 to 1987, he served on the Finance and Health, Environment, Welfare and Institutions committees and was a legislative member of the Board of Directors for the Colorado Housing Finance Authority.

Of particular significance to the University of Colorado has been his role as a negotiator and arbitrator when critical

issues in the Senate have surfaced. His personal and professional talents and skills in analyzing issues and bringing them to closure are among the attributes that he has brought to Colorado government.

UCCS has benefited from Senator Bird's commitment to sound and equitable decision making, clarity in direction, and his ability to set forth alternatives on behalf of his constituents and all the citizens of Colorado.

It is appropriate, therefore, that Senator Michael C. Bird be the recipient of the University of Colorado at Colorado Springs Legislative Recognition Award for 1988.

THE PRESIDENTIAL CHAIN OF OFFICE

The Presidential Chain of Office was created in 1980 by Mary Sartor, M.F.A., University of Colorado, Boulder, for the inauguration of President Arnold R. Weber. The Chain was a gift to the University by Mr. and Mrs. David G. Hawthorn, Class of '24.

Colorado gold and silver are used throughout the chain to symbolize the importance of those minerals to the history of the State. The gem stones chosen also consist entirely of minerals from Colorado.

Three pendants are suspended on the chain. The back pendant is the Seal of the State of Colorado surrounded by a golden ribbon representing the golden Circle of Knowledge. The top pendant in the front, the Seal of the University of Colorado surmounted by an arch set with diamond and topaz, signifies the necessary link between the search for knowledge and its practical application to the world outside the University. The Seal is supported at the bottom by the laurel wreaths found in the Seal, emblematic of honor and success.

The bottom pendant is centered with a golden topaz indicating man's quest for knowlege. The surrounding ring is paved with fragmented cubes and diamonds which suggest fragments of knowledge with brilliant breakthroughs of understanding.

The chain surrounding these pendants symbolizes the endless but ever-changing cycle of human knowledge.

THE UNIVERSITY SEAL

The University of Colorado has used three different seals in its lifetime.

The present seal, adopted in 1908, depicts a classical Greek male figure seated against a pillar and holding a scroll. A burning torch framed in laurel is placed beside him. The Greek inscription means "Let your light shine."

According to Denver designer Henry Read, the classical design was used because Greek civilization "stands as the criterion of culture." The laurel symbolizes honor or success, the youth of the figure suggests the "morning of life," and the scroll represents written language.

From 1893 to 1908, a seal was used which copies Wyon's medallion, "Science Trims the Lamp of Life." The classical figure of a kneeling Greek woman was flanked by mariposa lilies, which President Baker described as "a true Colorado flower."

Before 1893, a seal was used which essentially copies the Colorado state seal. It was never adopted by the Regents.

The official seal of the University of Colorado is used only by the Regents in transmitting official business.

THE NORLIN CHARGE TO GRADUATES

(From the baccalaureate address by President George Norlin, of the University of Colorado, June 1935.)

"You are now certified to the world at large as alumni of the University. She is your kindly mother and you her cherished sons and daughters.

"This exercise denotes, not your severance from her, but your union with her. Commencement does not mean, as many wrongly think, the breaking of ties and the beginning of a life apart. Rather it marks your initiation in the fullest sense into fellowship of the University, as bearers of her torch, as centers of her influence, as promoters of her spirit.

"The University is not the campus, not the buildings on the campus, nor the faculties, not the students of any one time—not one of these or all of them. The University consists of all who come into and go forth from her

halls, who are touched by her influence and who carry on her spirit. Wherever you go, the University goes with you. Wherever you are at work there is the University at work.

"What the University purposes to be, what it must always strive to be, is represented on its seal, which is stamped on your diplomas—a lamp in the hands of youth. If its light shine not in you and from you, how great is the darkness! But if it shine in you, today and in the thousands before you, who can measure its power?

"With hope and faith, I welcome you into the fellowship. I bid you farewell only in the sense that I pray you may fare well. You go forth, but not from us. We remain, but not servered from you. God go with you and be with you and us."

ACADEMIC DRESS

The tradition of the academic costume apparently began during the twelfth or thirteenth century in the early European universities. Since the clergy composed the majority of the educated class, academic dress is an adaptation of the cope or mantle which was usually of silk or wool, and worn by church dignitaries in religious processions.

Through the years, great diversity in color and in style of cap, gown and hood developed. In 1896, the colleges and universities in the United States adopted a uniform code governing academic dress. Today, the black gown, hood, and mortar board worn by the graduates in most institutions follow this code.

While it is not apparent to the casual observer, the gowns worn by the recipients of the various degrees vary somewhat in design. The sleeves of the gown worn by the baccalaureate candidate are long and pointed, while the sleeves of the gown worn by the master's degree recipient are square at one end with a slit at the elbow. The doctor's gown has flowing sleeves with three bars of velvet, and a facing of velvet down the front of the gown.

Those who receive a master's or a doctor's degree from the University of Colorado wear hoods lined with the school colors, silver and gold. The hood worn by the doctor's candidate differs in design from that of the master's as it has side panels and is slightly longer. The velvet border of the hood indicated the degree and usually follows the same code as the color of the tassels.

The oxford cap, usually referred to as a mortar board, is black and has a long tassel which is fastened by a button on the top. Candidates for the baccalaureate degree wear the tassel pendant over the right front of the cap before the degree is conferred, then it is worn on the left side.
